During the existence of our Branch, problems have often arisen due to insufficient solidarity, understaffing of the board and differences of opinion. However, the Branch has always been able to find the right direction and if a difficult problem arose or a "fire had to be put out", Fred de Graaf was always (and still is) willing to lend a helping hand.

The beautiful badge associated with our anniversary is of course available to all members and was also presented to members on July 2 during the celebrations.

In July there were various activities. This has been given ample attention in our magazine. Especially the performance of the Colour Party in Groesbeek during the Four Days Marches stands out.

Finally, I would like to draw attention to our plans to have more young people join our involve activities.

One problem is that according to Canadian regulations, young people must be at least 18 years old to become a member. This also applies to participation in the Colour Party. Nevertheless, we think it is very important that young people are involved at an early stage in commemorations and education about the Second World War and other armed conflicts and hope to come up with a constructive approach in the short term.

<u>Groesbeek, July 20, 2023.</u>

The day the 'hills must be conquered' during the Nijmegen 4-Days Marches. A report from the editors about the involvement of RCL Branch 005 during this day.

Thursday morning: 1,354 walkers did not appear at the start.

Not at the start, but present early at the Canadian War Cemetery: the promotion team, with tent, of RCL 'Liberation of the Netherlands' Branch 005.

A little later, the members of the Colour Party of RCL005 Branch 005 arrived. Present to accompany the military groups that wanted to pay tribute to the fallen.



The President also made an appearance.

The run-up was quiet in the beginning.

There were also individual walkers who paid a moment of respect to the fallen.

The military share in 2023: 6,222 persons, of which 2,183 had the Dutch nationality.







Although? A look in their First Aid tent showed that their feet also had 'some problems'.

In total, the military contingent consisted of 37 nationalities. The 'flag parade' resulted in a nice photo.



Most of them came from Switzerland. The Swiss were not very impressed by the Dutch hills.









It was also quiet for the Colour Party (CP) in the first few hours. After noon, however, it became very busy. For the CP it was at least an hour and a half 'At Attention' and 'Carry Colours'.

The two less experienced members of the CP got a 100% share this day, but the experienced members also had a hard time.















However, no effort is too great for our fallen liberators and those who still honour them.

Our RCL005 comrade Peter Bongers walked the 4-Days Marches for the 34th time and was spotted by our photographer Anneke Poppenk. Watch and listen, in Dutch, to **the interview.**

On the morning of April 12, 1945, 'C' Company of No. 7 troop of the 8th Canadian Reconnaissance Regiment, including five armoured cars and about a hundred men, rolled into the camp in the twilight of the morning.

The platoon of 21-year-old Lieutenant Ted Sheppard was among the first to enter the camp.

They approached cautiously, Sheppard explained. The watchtowers were empty, the gates were open, and the parade ground and camp courtyard were deserted. "It felt like we were in an abandoned ghost town."

Sheppard reported his findings to headquarters. His unit was ordered to continue the advance. The Royal Hamilton Light Infantry Regiment took over control of the camp.

During a short ceremony at the cemetery in Ten Boer, a large wreath was laid on the graves of the crew members of LQ-M for Mother.



Exactly 80 years ago, they died on their 17th flight en route to Essen, Germany, to bomb the Krupp factories there. Unfortunately, they were not allowed to return and they rest forever in Dutch soil.

Around 200 invited and interested people gathered around the 6 tombstones. At 7:30PM, a veteran gave a speech. After the Last Post, the national anthems of England and Canada were played.

Many visitors then walked past the graves to pay their respect.

RCL005 ACTIVITIES WITH THE PRESENCE OF THE PROMOTION TENT.

In September there are a number of activities related to the Battle of Arnhem in 1944. The Promotion Tent of the Royal Canadian Legion 'Liberation of the Netherlands' Branch 005 is present at two important events. Put it in your diary and come and meet us!

The Airborne Walking Tour will take place on September 2, 2023.

This is a tribute to the more than 1,700 British, Polish and Canadian victims who lost their lives in the Battle of Arnhem and are buried at the Airborne Cemetery in Oosterbeek.

In 1947, the Police Sports Association Renkum organized the "Airborne March" for the first time. A 'memorial march' to honour those who fought for the liberation of our country in the September days of 1944 in the Oosterbeek area.

About 2,000 walkers took part in the first Airborne March, making the march a success right from the start.

With the permission of Major-General R.E. Urquhart, CB, DSO (commander of the 1st Airborne Division) the march was named "Airborne Walk" and allowed to use the Pegasus decal.



Nowadays, around 35,000 people take part in this march every year.

The Airborne Walk has four route distances, namely: 10, 15, 25 and 40 kilometers (40 km not for groups). The four routes lead walkers past striking places, which are reminders of what happened in Arnhem and the surrounding area during World War II.

The routes also take the participators through rustic forests on the Veluwezoom. In some places a beautiful view of the Rhine is offered.

On September 16, 2023, the Airborne Landings and Commemoration will take place.



As every year on the Ginkelse Heide near Ede. During Operation Market Garden in 1944, some 2,200 Allied paratroopers landed on the Ginkelse Heide. This in an attempt to conquer the bridges at Arnhem.

Every year in September, this day is commemorated and relived during the Airborne landings.





This happens in the presence of the last veterans at the Airborne monument. On this day, between 9.00AM and 3:30PM, we will reflect on how valuable our peace and freedom is.

Celebration Canada Day. Report by Ruud Janssen.

Every year on July 1, Canada celebrates its date of origin in 1867.

Of course Canadians or people with a "Canadian heart" in the Netherlands participate in this.

However, we (Dutchies) don't get a day off as Canadians do.



That is why the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 005, 'Liberation of the Netherlands, celebrates this day on a Sunday, so that as many comrades as possible can celebrate it together.

This year was a good time, because RCL005 was installed 20 years ago in August. So last Sunday, July 2, all members were invited to come to the RCL005 clubhouse "Restaurant Mondani" in Lochem. The weather was good, so it was nice to sit outside. New members were also present, such as members of the Dutch Polar Bears. There was some praising about last week's beautiful commemoration in Rucphen (see our June newsletter).

There was a full WW2 field kitchen set up in the parking lot of Restaurant Mondani. The peeling of the potatoes and vegetables for the Canadian Stew started early in the day. A dessert was also provided. Canadian pancakes with fruit in them. Everything fresh and natural. Next to the field kitchen a beautiful military vehicle from that time and on the other side a motorcycle and another special classic car. Beautiful.

From 2.00PM the grounds started to fill up and everyone found their place at the front or back of the restaurant. Two live music sides provided beautiful and sometimes very appropriate notes. We thank them for that.

At one point, President Martin Reelick took the floor and introduced comrade Fred de Graaf, also co-founding father of RCL005. He quoted some historical moments and expressed the hope that we can all continue to work towards the main objective of RCL005, which is: commemorating and remembering the fallen liberators of our country.

Once again the President took the floor and announced the board's intention to involve the youth more in what the Legion means.

For this Suzanne Groeneveld (15 year old daughter of comrade Reinier) was asked if she was willing to start this youth department.
